White chocolate cookies



Method

STEP 1

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4 and line two large baking sheets with baking parchment. Beat the butter and sugars together in a large bowl using an electric whisk, or in a stand mixer until just combined. Crack in the egg and beat again. Stir through the vanilla, flour, bicarb, chocolate chunks and ¼ tsp fine sea salt.

STEP 2

Roll the mixture into 10 even-sized balls between the palms of your hands. Arrange over the prepared baking sheets and bake for 10-12 mins until golden brown at the edges. Leave to cool slightly on the sheets, then transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool completely, or eat warm with ice cream.

Ingredients

- 120g unsalted butter, softened
- 85g light brown soft sugar
- 65g golden caster sugar
- 1 medium egg
- 1 tsp vanilla bean paste
- 180g plain flour
- ½ tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 180g white chocolate, broken into chunks

This year, 109 of our fabulous mathematicians across Year 7 and Year 8 were invited to take part in the Junior Maths Challenge. This challenge is designed to encourage mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. Most problems are accessible, yet still challenge those with more experience.

Whilst all pupils receive a participation award for taking part, we were thrilled to have pupils achieve Bronze, Silver, Gold and even Kangaroo (qualification into an extra round) awards! Here is a breakdown of the results:

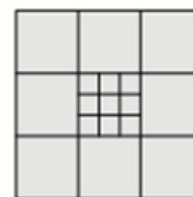

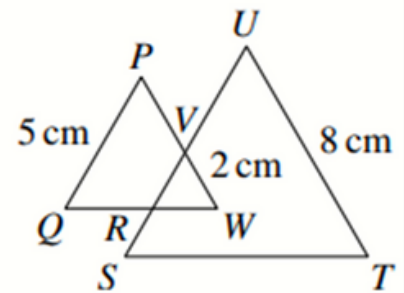

Timberhonger Children's Challenge, Bromsgrove Carnival 16th July

As part of Bromsgrove Carnival weekend, there will be a fun run for children up to the age of 10 in aid of local charities; Bromsgrove Scouts, the Basement Project, and Sense. The run will be split into two age groups with 7s and under doing approximately 800m and the 8-10s just under a mile. Races start at 5pm on Saturday 16th July, entirely within the safe confines of Sanders Park, Bromsgrove. Everyone who finishes gets a proper race medal and a big cheer as they cross the line, and there are prizes for the first three home in each age category. In previous years there have been over 150 children taking part. If mums and dads and older brothers and sisters fancy a go too then there is the annual Timberhonger 10k race and new for 2022 is a challenging 5k run for anyone aged 11+. Both races start just after the fun run at 6pm.
