What does it mean to be a Muslim in Britain today?		
Muslims in the UK	 Many Muslims in Britain today were born in Britain (47%). There are around 1.9 billion Muslims worldwide out of a global population of over 7 billion. This makes Islam the world's second biggest religion after Christianity (2.4 billion). There are two main groups of Muslims, Sunni (around 90% of Muslims) and Shi'a. The main difference is around which leader should have followed on from the Prophet Muhammad (pbuh). In the West Midlands (our area) there are over 300,000 Muslims 	
Five Pillars of Islam	 The five pillars of Islam are essentials of the life of a Muslim. They are an expression of ibadah (worship and belief in action). The five pillars provide a structure for Islamic daily spiritual life. The five pillars of Islam are; o Shahadah - a belief in one God and Muhammad as God's Messenger o Salah - prayer, five times a day o Sawm – fasting during daylight hours in the month of Ramadan o Zakat – the giving of alms o Hajj – pilgrimage to Makkah (or Mecca) These affect the life of a Muslim moment by moment (Shahadah), daily (Salah), annually (Zakat, Sawm) and once in a lifetime (Hajj). 	
 Muslims pray to worship God, because he is Creator and has no equal. Muslims recite set prayers silently during salah. Muslims also pray together in the mosque, led by an imam (Muslim leader) who leads the people in the rak'ahs (prayer positions). There is a call to prayer from the mosque 5 times a day. Muslims perform ritual washing before prayer and face towards Mecca. Not all Muslims are the same, so there is variation in how they pray.

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	 Ramadan is the busiest time of the year in every mosque. It is the month in which the revelation of the Qur'an began. 			
	• The main period of fasting happens during the month of Ramadan. Muslims			
	go without food and water during the daylight hours for this month.			
	Fasting helps Muslims to appreciate how poor people suffer. It also			
	concentrates the mind on what it means to be a Muslim and obey the			
Ramadan	 commands of Allah. It helps to build discipline into the life of a Muslim. Every night during Ramadan, there is an additional prayer (taraweeh) after 			
	the last of the 5 daily salahs. During these prayers, each lasting about an			
	hour, recitation of the whole Qur'an is completed during the month.			
	• A charity collection takes place every night before the start of prayer.			
	• Eid-ul-Fitr, a festival at the end of Ramadan, is a day of celebration,			
	happiness and forgiveness.			
	 Muslims get their good advice from a variety of sources including; The Qur'an: Muslims believe the words came directly from Allah and that they 			
	should follow the words and instructions of the Qur'an exactly.			
	They also look to Hadith : words, actions and instructions of the Prophet			
	Muhammad (pbuh) as reported by the people around him during his life.			
The Qur'an	 Muslims believe that the words of the Qur'an were revealed to the Prophet 			
	Muhammad (pbuh) through the Angel Jibril (Gabriel) in the desert near			
	Makkah over 1,400 years ago.			
	They believe that the Qur'an is God's final message to humanity.			
	• The Qur'an is kept on a high shelf and Muslims wash before handling it.			
	 It is written in the Arabic language. A mosque is a building where Muslims can come together to pray. Anywhere 			
	a Muslim chooses for prayer is believed to become a mosque for that time.			
	 Features on the outside of the mosque include a minaret and a dome. 			
	• The most important part of a mosque is the hall where people pray.			
	• Mosques have no pictures or statues. Instead they are usually decorated with

riosques	 There are a number of different ways that respect is shown to Allah, the Prophet Muhammad and the holy Qur'an. These include: removing shoes, 			
	washing before prayer, having a clean prayer mat, bowing to Allah, raising
