Candlemas - A celebration of Light

Whilst we are now well settled into 2023 and Christmas may seem long ago, the liturgical season of Christmastide actually draws to a close this week with the celebration of Candlemas. This Christian festival recalls the baby Jesus being presented in the Temple (as was required for all first-born Israelites) and the words of the prophet Simeon on seeing the Christ-child and recognising in Him the fulfilment of God's promises to send a Messiah to rescue his people. His words, known as the Nunc Dimittis (and found in the second chapter of Luke's Gospel, verses 29–32) are prayed or sung each evening/night by Anglican, Catholic and Orthodox Christians across the world (here they are shown in the translation found in the 1662 Book of Common Prayer):

Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace according to thy word.

For mine eyes have seen:
thy salvation;
Which thou hast prepared:
before the face of all people;
To be a light to lighten the Gentiles:
and to be the glory of thy people Israel

Traditionally Candlemas is celebrated as a festival of light, with candle-lit processions, and the people bringing their supply of candles for the year to church to be blessed by the priest. Perhaps you might like to mark this feast yourself by lighting a candle and placing it in a window, or on a mantlepiece to help bring to mind the light of Christ shining out into the world for all nations.

Vegan Flapjacks



Method

STEP 1

Heat the oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 4 and line a 20cm square baking tin with baking parchment.

STEP 2

Melt the dairy-free spread, sugar and syrup in a saucepan over a medium heat. Remove from the heat and tip in the oats, chopped nuts and dried fruit. Transfer to the tin, packing the mix in with the back of a spoon.

STEP 3

Bake for 30 – 35 mins until lightly golden and crisp around the edges. Leave to cool in the tin before slicing into squares. *Keep in an airtight container for up to three days.*

Ingredients

- 140g dairy-free spread
- 140g soft light brown sugar
- 2 tbsp golden syrup
- 175g rolled oats
- 75g chopped nuts of your choice


Young Voices 2023


On Thursday 26th January we took part in the 2023 Young Voices concert, with conductor David Lawrence, at Resorts World Arena in Birmingham.
