Easter Egg Cheesecake



Method

STEP 1

Oil a 20cm deep springform cake tin and line with baking parchment. Tip the digestive biscuits into a food bag or the bowl of a food processor and crush or blitz to a fine crumb. Mix with the melted butter, then press into the base of the prepared cake tin and chill for 30 mins.

STEP 2

Roughly chop half the chocolate mini eggs. Beat the soft cheese with the icing sugar and vanilla until just combined using an electric whisk. Clean the beaters, then beat the double cream to stiff peaks in a separate bowl. Gently fold the whipped cream into the soft cheese mixture along with the chopped chocolate mini eggs. Spoon the cheesecake mixture over the biscuit base, then smooth the surface with a palette knife or spatula. Chill overnight.

STEP 3

The next day, carefully release the cheesecake from the tin (you may need to run a cutlery knife around the edge to loosen it) and top with the remaining whole chocolate mini eggs to decorate.

Ingredients

- vegetable oil, for the tin
- 200g digestive biscuits
- 80g unsalted butter, melted
- 250g chocolate mini eggs or leftover Easter eggs
- 400g full-fat soft cheese
- 150g icing sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla bean paste
- 400g double cream


On Monday 27th February our Year 8 Mock Trial team had a visit to the Magistrates' Court in Worcester. This was in preparation for the Mock Trial Competition. We spent the whole morning there and it was really interesting to see a court in action. We listened to a variety of cases and were intrigued to find out the verdicts. Seeing the court room and how the Usher, Lawyers, Legal Adviser and Magistrates acted helped us with our nerves for the competition itself! We would like to thank our link Magistrate, Brent Robinson for organising the visit and Mrs Hall and Mrs Woodward for accompanying us.



On Saturday 11th March our Mock Trial team took part in the Worcestershire and Herefordshire heat of the national competition at Worcester Magistrates' Court. This competition is open to Year 8 and Year 9 pupils and we have been practising weekly from November. Our team had to prosecute and defend a case of alleged possession of an offensive weapon, in this case, a lump hammer, in a public place without reasonable excuse. We studied the case and spent time drafting and redrafting our speeches, questions and possible answers. We also spent time learning the roles of different people in a court room (including Lawyer, Usher, Magistrate, Legal adviser and Witness). On the day of the competition we saw that there were nine schools there (including only one other middle school). Thus, most of our competitors were Year 9 pupils which was a little scary! We kept having to be reminded that they were only one year older than us. We prosecuted the case against a team from Prince Henry's High School and defended against a team from The Bishop of Hereford's Bluecoat School. We developed our confidence and many skills in this process and we did enjoy the experience.

A survey was launched by Worcestershire County Council on Monday 27 March which aims to get the views and experiences from autistic people, families, provider organisations, professionals and everyone in our local communities. By completing the survey you will be helping to shape a new Autism Strategy, that will help support autistic people in Herefordshire and Worcestershire in their everyday lives.

The new All-Age Autism Strategy will be developed in line with the National Autism Strategy. It will focus on 7 priority areas:

- Improving understanding and acceptance of autism within society.
- Improving autistic children and young people's access into education and support positive transitions into adulthood.
- Supporting more autistic people into employment.
- Tackling health and care inequalities for autistic people
- Building the right support in the community.
- Improving support in criminal and youth justice systems.
- Keeping safe.


