In any other school this would be an exceptional week but not at St. John's which again you will be able to see from the Newsletter!


We welcome our new Deputy Head, Mr. Kevin Medway who will join us after Easter and we look forward to the contribution that he will make to St. John's.






relaxation techniques in sessions to be run just before the tests in May and once again we will be offering free breakfast to all Yr6 pupils each morning of the testing week.





A word from the Vicar



Legacy 110 Project

As I am sure many of you are aware that the years 2014-18 mark the 100th anniversary of the First World War, and with this in mind the Government have been funded 2 students from every secondary school in the country to visit the Battlefields in France and Belgium as part of the Legacy 110 project, and we have managed to secure 2 places on a visit for October this year.

The idea behind the Legacy 110 project is that students from every secondary school in the country attend the trip and complete a personalised project. This is then presented to a further 110 people in their local community, thereby reaching the same amount of people that died during the war.

We offered students in year 7 the chance to apply to go on the visit and were overwhelmed by the amount of fantastic responses and the effort students had put into their applications making it very hard to choose! MATHS

An example activity included creating pi paper chains with each colour standing for a different value to represent the first of pi's infinite decimal places.
