Unbelievably we are almost two thirds of the way through the academic year and with the National Curriculum tests just around the corner our Year 6 pupils are really having to 'Give of their Best!' It is such a pleasure to see our pupils so focussed and

This year we have been able to offer many of our pupils extra support not only through our day to day lessons but also through interventions, booster clubs and peer to peer mentoring. I would personally like to thank all the staff and pupils involved in giving our children the support needed to take their tests with confidence. Once again we will be offering a free breakfast to all of our Year 6 pupils each morning of the testing week. This will be a great opportunity for them to get into school in plenty of time, have something tasty to start the day and also the chance to chat with friends and relax before the tests begin.

As Year 6 have almost 170,000 achievement points to date it's clear to see that our pupils are still working hard to gain points for their efforts. Currently 6SY seem untouchable with a staggering 31,000 points however 6GM are not too far behind. 6MC and 6KLN have the best attendance, exceeding our school target of 97% which is incredible considering the number of winter illnesses that have been around. As a year group we are currently under our whole school target but hopefully with the warmer weather and lighter nights we will soon be back on track.

I would like to congratulate Joseph Roberts 6KD and Matilda Holder 6SY for achieving the Head Teacher's award this term. Many of our pupils were nominated for this award so it's always a difficult decision to make and therefore a huge accolade for the final two winners.

With our next 'Give of your best' trip to Drayton Manor Theme Park on the horizon I'm hoping to see as many of our Year 6 pupils achieving the required amount of points to be invited on this visit. This will allow them to celebrate the end of a challenging year in their education.

I would like to wish all the staff who work with and alongside our Year 6 pupils an enjoyable and much deserved break. Happy Easter to one and all!

Finally I would like to congratulate our pupils on their attitude to learning so far this year and wish them all good look in their forthcoming tests.





It's hard to believe that we are over half way through the year but the warmth in the sunshine and the days getting longer are just confirming how quickly this academic year is going. The pupils continue to make the most of

ePraise points on offer; amassing over a staggering 142,243 points so far at the time of writing with an average of 976 points per pupil. I set the target of breaking 250,000 points by the end of July – can we do it? Harriet and Adam continue to lead the way of the Year 7 pupils but Callum and Rosie are close behind with only 60 points separating the top 10. 7AME continue to be winning the battle of the form classes being a few hundred points ahead of 7MAR and congratulations to 7MMO who currently have the best attendance of all the Year 7 Classes, just point two ahead of 7JD. All these points mean prizes and I know all those that came to the cinema enjoyed their

reward, keep working hard to earn those points to enable you to purchase the Alton Towers trip.

I would like to thank all the parents that attended the recent parent evenings, Year 7 parents alone attended over 1600 appointments over the parent's evenings this year. Your continued support in your child's educational journey is very much appreciated. If you have any further concerns or questions please do not hesitate to contact your child's form or subject teacher.

Our two residential trips are approaching quickly with pupil's visiting Arete in North Wales to undertake a whole host of outdoor activities and a Science and French trip to France and the Loire Valley. I am sure that both trips will be fantastic, not forgetting the upcoming trips available for Year 7 pupils next year when the move to Year 8; including the Ski trip and the London trip. This is a key part in what makes attending St John's such a positive experience.

With only one term remaining we will continue to be observing and identifying pupils for key roles next year, such as Prefects, House Captains and Head Boy or Girl. All Key Stage Three staff will be looking out for pupil's working hard and displaying a positive attitude over these final few months to help decide who should be given these prestigious positions. It is not going to be an easy task given the strength of pupils in the year group.



Lets just hope this warm weather continues.




