Collective Worship

As we wind our way through Advent journeying, like Mary and Joseph, the Shepherds and the Magi, towards that lowly stable where heaven and earth meet in the birth of a small, frail, human baby; it can be easy to let the tinsel, baubles, shopping and plethora of mince pies and chocolate, drown out the quiet but pervasive song of eternity which underlies both the joy and celebration of Christmas, and also the stress, the worry the loneliness which many also experience at this time of year.

Two thousand and twenty-one years ago Jesus was born not into a palace, but into a manager, a trough where animals fed; into a country not at peace, but a people under Roman occupation and ruled by a puppet King whose murderous rage would force them to flee as refugees into Egypt.

We might find comfort in amid the disruptions and uncertainties of the past two years, that Jesus too knew what it was like to live in uncertain times. As the wellknown Christmas Carol 'Once in Royal David's City' puts it "He was little, weak and helpless; tears and smiles like us he knew." Wherever and however we find ourselves this Christmas; Christ came for us, was born on earth for us. He comes 'to the least of these', and 'for such as time as this'.

We will gather together in St John's Church (God willing) on Friday to light our Christingles, hear the Christmas story and sing about Christ's birth; celebrating that in spite of all the world might throw at us, "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1:5)

Evelyn Underhill, twentieth century Anglican mystic and writer, wrote about the need to 'tune into the music of eternity'; to stop and pause and find a moment of silence in which to listen and just 'be'. In her words: "I do hope your Christmas has had a little touch of Eternity in among the rush and pitter patter and all. It always seems such a mixing of this world and the next - but that after all is the idea!"



It came upon the midnight clear, that glorious song of old, from angels bending near the earth, to touch their harps of gold: "Peace on the earth, to all good will from heaven's all-gracious king!" The world in solemn stillness lay, to hear the angels sing.

Yet with the woes of sin and strife The world has suffered long; Beneath the angel strain have rolled Two thousand years of wrong; And man, at war with man, hears not The love-song which they bring; Oh, hush the noise, ye men of strife And hear the angels sing.

Gingerbread Man



Method

STEP 1

Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Line 2 baking sheets with baking parchment. Melt butter, sugar and syrup in a pan. Mix flour, soda, spices and a pinch of salt in a bowl. Stir in the butter mix and chopped ginger to make a stiff-ish dough.

STEP 2

Wait until cool enough to handle, then roll out dough to about 5mm thick. Stamp out gingerbread men, re-rolling and pressing the trimmings back together and rolling again. Lift onto baking sheets. Bake for 12 mins until golden. Cool 10 mins on the sheets, then lift onto cooling racks.

STEP 3

To decorate, mix icing sugar with a few drops of water until thick and smooth. Halve then slice cherries thinly to make smiles, and cut ginger into small squares. Spoon icing into a food bag, snip off the tiniest bit from one corner, then squeeze eyes and buttons, and a tiny smile onto 1 man at a time. Stick on a cherry smile and ginger buttons. Repeat; leave to set. Will keep up to 1 week in an airtight tin.

Ingredients

140g unsalted butter, 100g dark muscovado sugar 3 tbsp golden syrup, 350g plain flour, 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda, 2 tsp ground ginger, 1 tsp ground cinnamon, pinch of cayenne pepper (optional), 2 balls stem ginger from a jar, chopped

To decorate

50g icing sugar, a few glacé cherries (we used undyed), 2 balls stem ginger

Severn Arts teaches children music in our school. If your child is interested in learning to play an instrument or would like to have singing lessons during the school day this can be arranged with Severn Arts.

Instruments in the brass, stringed and woodwind families are all taught as well as percussion, piano and guitar, and many of the instruments taught are available to hire.

Lessons are available as 20-minute individual lessons (£12.90 per lesson), 20-minute group lesson (2 people – £6.45 per lesson, per person) or 30-minute individual lesson (£19.35 per lesson).
